

Demographics & Prevalence

NUMBER OF CALIFORNIANS AGE 60+ BY YEAR



BY 2040 IN CALIFORNIA THE NUMBER OF:

- Women will increase 11%
- Latinos will more than triple
- Black/African Americans will nearly triple
- AAPI will more than double

Inequities

African American/Blacks:

 2X more likely to have Alzheimer's/dementia

Hispanics/Latinos:

 1.5X more likely to have Alzheimer's/dementia

More likely to get diagnosed in the late stage of the disease

 34% Asian Americans report discrimination when seeking health care

Inequities

Caregivers report:

- Access fewer formal supports
- Experience higher rates of depression



Perceive Discrimination

Latinos report:

- 18% believe discrimination is a barrier
- 34% experience discrimination
- 28% of caregivers experience discrimination

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
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Beliefs

- Mental illness, embarrassment & personal weakness
- Delay in seeking help/diagnosis

Beliefs

Collectivistic culture

- Group goals > individual goals
- > Indebtedness
- Better at absorbing additional caregiving
- > Less willing to ask for help

Filial Piety

- Rooted in various Asian cultures
- Obligation to aging parents
- > Informal caregiving
- > ≯(elder) + 子 (son)

Practices

- Cultural sensitivity No one size fits all
 - Recognize cultural background; the diversity of Asian American
 - Include cultural beliefs when making decisions/suggestions

Address language barriers

> Comprehensive explanation


- > Provide written materials

Family-centered service


- Understand family relationships/structure



- 對話時難以承接
- 不能理解你在說什麼
- 只能用他們的母語或第一語言說話

您可以做些什麼?

使用短句和簡單字句

- 用簡短的回答方式 (簡短詞句
- 給予逐步指示
- 如患者未能即時聽明白, 請慢慢重複您的指示或話詞
- 即使對方需要很長時間來回答。也請盡量保持耐心和正面的態度
- 書品不要提醒他們忘記了。或某事他們已跟你給過了
- 以簡單的方式來提問和同答 加「晦飯你相吃什麽? 鱼漫具雞?
- 以對方可田「具」或「盃」本向答的方式規則
- 盡量不要使用對待兒童的方式來對待他們(尊重對方),盡量避免使用負面 的用語。避免說「不要從這門出去!」,嘗試說「我們走這邊!」,並輕輕地引導 對方數體則以 道門

讓他們把注意力集中在您身上

- 與他們平視
- 唤對方的名字
- 拿開令人分心的東西, 比如關掉電視機, 帶他們到安靜的房間
- 注意您的語彙,說話的音量及身體語言 這些非言語的溝通方式往往比言語 「說」得更大聲
- 做一個積極的傾聽者一有眼神接觸,點頭

其他可嘗試的方法

- 把文字或圖片貼在門上, 以說明房間或櫃子裏面有什麼
- 為對方進行聽力測試, 以確保他們可以聽到您的聲音
- 使用粉筆或白板寫下 天的日程表或常見問題的答案
- 同應對方的威受武情緒 不僅僅具言語 超對方交談 而不是和別人談論
- 如果對話困難,但您想跟他 起做點事,嘗試聽音樂或看舊家庭照片
